# Profile Form for Nominees for President-elect

To do this we need to be grounded in our spiritual practices of advocacy, prayer, worship, study of the Scriptures, and service.

Living the reality of this loving community means entering deeper into the covenant relationship between the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress and First Peoples and the Uniting Church. This is a challenge for each of us individually, for our congregations, and for all our councils. Paying attention to difficult stories, mourning with those who mourn, lamenting our inaction, and

continuing our commitment to be led by God in working for justice and partnership between First and Second Peoples. Providing such a witness and learning from the witness of others can give glimpses of the beauty of the vision that God has for the world and shared with us in the life, death and resurrection of Jesus the Christ.

To be this loving community of faith we are to work on our relationships with each other. We are to listen and learn from one another, from the ways we interpret the Scriptures and live out our lives of faith. We can learn so much from our partner churches in the Pacific, Asia and Africa. We can learn so much from our Ecumenical brothers and sisters and we can learn so much by listening to people of all cultures in our part of the universal church and beyond.

#### The Covenant

I will work to deepen the relationship between the UCA and the Uniting Aboriginal and Islander Christian Congress. This includes promoting opportunities for congregations and other councils of the church to listen to, learn from and partner with First Peoples in their own contexts. It also includes creating more platforms for First Peoples in the church to share their wisdom and their calls for justice.

### Our foundations of being the Uniting Church

I will encourage the church to live out the gospel in 'fresh words and deeds' (Basis of Union paragraph 11) looking for and living as glimpses of the reign of God in this world. I will encourage the practice of all of our spiritual disciplines as above to grow our capacity to live out our lives as disciples of Christ. This includes deep engagement with the Scriptures, listening to and learning from each other's stories of faith, and practicing our worship of, witness to and service for God.

# **Future of the Church**

I will encourage creative, innovative ways to gather as community, grow our connection with each other and with God, the Holy Trinity of Love. When we focus on God's calling to us as part of the people of God the change in the church's place in society becomes easier to bear. This focus also pushes us to listen to the edges rather than be concerned with being at the centre. As someone who has grown up after the heyday of the 1960s church, I am not mourning the loss. I am ready to dance in the joy and freedom that comes with Christ and the power of the Spirit, to try new things, to value that which has gone before and to carry what is needed on the way.

## Leadership

'All gifts have their corresponding service' (Basis of Union Paragraph 13). I will create opportunities for young people to lead and take responsibility for the role the church has as part of the ongoing reconciliation of the whole creation. We all have different roles in being the people of God. I will encourage the sharing of these gifts and the valuing of these roles across the whole people of God.

#### **Oriented towards Justice**

I will encourage the whole church to engage in the vocation of discipleship, bringing into intentional conversation our faith, our contexts, and our daily lives. I will work with our partner churches and ecumenical bodies to advocate for climate justice and provide guidance for the church to live out its commitment to be an environmentally responsible church.
